Do You Have These Resume Items?

1) Is your SAT [superscore](#) above a 1530 or is your ACT Score above a 34?

This is number 1. As we explain in our Elite Institution Secrets Ebook, the SAT is critical for determining your chances of getting into the school of your dreams. While a higher score above a 1530 doesn't necessarily mean a higher chance of getting in, any score below 1530 will definitely hurt your chances substantially.

In a similar vein, a person's ACT score is critical in deciding whether or not they get into the school of their dreams. The cutoff number (as it stands now) is a score of a 34. To get into a tier 1 school, the schools expect a score of a 34 or higher. If your score is a 34 or higher it doesn't necessarily help your chances of getting into the school, but the further below a 34 your score is, the less likely you will get into this type of school.

2) Have you taken at least two SAT Subject tests?

As with the SAT, IB, and AP tests, these tests are critical in helping a college determine whether or not you can take classes at the college level and how prepared you are to do it.

Taking at least two of these tests (preferably one in the STEM field and one in the Humanities) and doing well on them shows that you are capable of doing very well in a college course and setting. Additionally, having done well in those two different fields shows a flexibility in academic aptitude which colleges love to see from applicants.

If you have not taken an SAT subject test, we recommend that you try to do that as soon as possible. Preferably taking one in the STEM field and another in a humanities or social science field.

3) Have you taken, or do you plan to take, at least 4 Ap tests or the IB exam?

These courses are designed to emulate a college course and if a student does well on these tests it is a clear indication that they are prepared for college at a Tier 1 school. A student taking 4 AP tests in a number of different courses with an average AP score from the different tests of a 4.5 or better shows colleges that the student in question can handle the challenging course load that will come with being accepted into a Tier 1 school.

4) Do you have at least 30 hours of volunteering experience?

This one is perhaps the one which can change your odds of getting into your dream college the quickest.

We've found that a very simple way to stand out from other applications is to have diverse volunteering experiences. The tipping point where volunteering starts to truly help a student's odds of getting into a Tier 1 school is about 25 hours and every hour past 25 hours helps a student's odds of getting into a Tier 1 school significantly. It helps colleges see that the student creates an impact in their community wherever they go and also gives students phenomenal stories that they use when writing about who they are and what they hope to give and receive from the college they'd like to attend.

This one is critical. We always recommend that all students try to find at least 30 hours of volunteering wherever possible to give themselves the best chance of getting into a Tier 1 school like Princeton, Harvard, Stanford, and Yale.
